Introduction:

- Our youth are busy. They have many extra-curricular activities from which to choose: horse shows, 4-H, church, sports, etc.
- Managing educational practices for youth of varying ages and knowledge levels.
- The development of knowledge and study materials can be daunting.

Equine knowledge & life skills development can be grasped through play as well as other models.

What you need to concentrate on:

- 1. Parts of the Horse
- 2. Basic Anatomy & Physiology
- 3. Selection/Judging

(include colors & breeds)

- 4. Events/Training
- 5. Diseases & Health Care
- 6. Nutrition
- 7. Management

For each session:

- Have a planned theme
- Have youth develop their own lessons/tests/questions to stump team mates
- Learning is always enhanced when one is forced to teach a subject.

Be Careful:

- Be honest
- Do not forget typical practice methods, but introduce them at a later time once they have mastered a topic.
- Know your youth's knowledge level. Do not begin too hard; Build confidence!

To Keep the Enthusiasm! Make it FUN!

- Develop knowledge levels easy to achieve
- Utilize field trips and speakers
- Light competition

- Always create situations where they can succeed
- Take an active role! Play with the youth

Here are some additional coaching suggestions for future Hippology participants.

1. Read the directions completely. Complete all spaces. Do not leave anything blank. Write legibility!

- 2. Usually your first answer is the correct one. Also, only the first answer will be accepted if they write two answers for the same question regardless if the second one is correct.
- 3. Senior need to learn to spell the words correctly.
- 4. Learn the parts of the horse (external parts, muscles, the different systems, etc.).
- 5. Learn the basic function of the systems. Many are similar to the human body.
- 6. Learn correct health care and management techniques.
- 7. Read through the sources (pictures, diagrams, etc.) for the event. These are listed in the rulebook. Each NC County Cooperative Extension Office was mailed a copy of the *AYHC Horse Industry Handbook* (blue notebook) and the *AYHC Youth Leader's Manual* (white notebook) several years ago. Active counties also was mailed the Lon Lewis book, *Feeding and Care of the Horse*. Some public libraries may purchase sources if asked.
- 8. Take equine related field trips.
- 9. Use tack magazines to learn the correct name and function of equipment. Most are free. Here are some samples.
