Trail Placings and Reasons

In our last issue we posted a link to a Trail class that was filmed at the 2013 Quarter Horse Congress Horse Judging Contest. The reasons below were prepared by 2015 NC State 4-H Horse Judging Team Member, Michaela Vick from Nash County.

Good Afternoon, 1243 was my alignment of this trail class. I found an obvious top individual who incurred no penalty points, a close middle pair, and an obvious bottom, who lacked the promptness and quality of the other individuals. Drawing your attention to my initial pair, I aligned 1, the liver chestnut, over 2, the dark bay, as 1 performed a more careful pattern, showing more style and a higher degree of difficulty, maneuvering more correctly through the gate with no hesitation, as well as being more mannerly and precise through the serpentine. I do grant, however, that 2 did work off a looser, freer rein. It was these characteristics which aided me in placing 2 over 4, the roan, in my intermediate pair.

2 was more easily guided through the course, loping cleaner with more style over the right lead poles, in addition to backing straighter in the "L" and turning flatter and easier in the box. I fully recognize that 4 did maintain more cadence and consistency when jogging the serpentine.

Directing your attention to my concluding pair, I preferred 4 over 3, the chestnut. 4 exhibited a more mannerly pattern, having a more consistent headset and quieter poll, as well as being more willfully guided through the back and into the box, taking a more correct, precise number of steps when jogging over the poles. Even though I grant that 3 maneuvered the gate with more flow, staying closer to that gate, this horse incurred the most penalty points, hitting a right lead pole. In addition, 3 mouthed the bit, and lacked the manners and quality of the other individuals in this class, and could therefore merit no higher placing today. Thank you.


