The Southern Regional 4-H Horse Championships is a unique Championship Horse Show and Educational Contest that welcomes the top 4-H horse competitors from the 13 southeastern states. Representatives from each state compete at the Southern Regional 4-H Horse Championships by competing at the state level and earning a spot as a top competitor. 2018 was the 47th year that this event has been held. It is held annually at the Georgia National Fairgrounds in Perry, GA and approximately 600 4-Hers competed in this event from 13 states.

Our NC delegation was made up of 48 representatives who competed in both educational events as well as the multi-discipline horse show. A brief summary of the results is below.

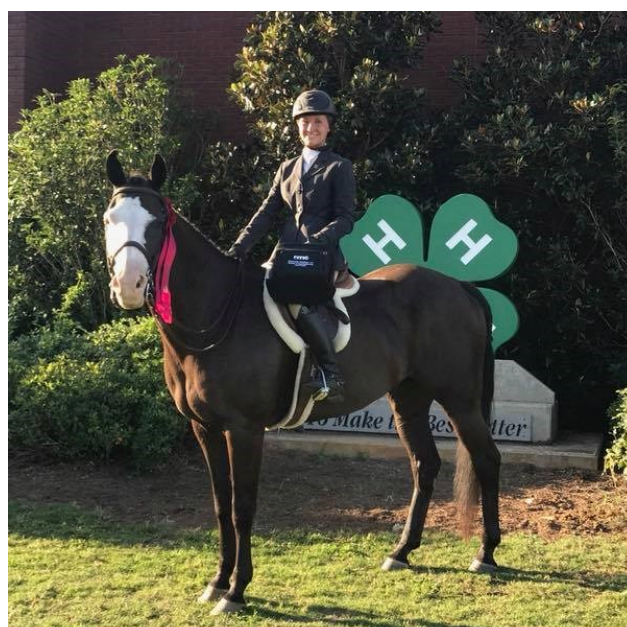

2018 4-H AIRE Winners

AIRE (Application, Resume, Interview and Essay) is a workforce development and college prep program. Youth, ages 11 – 18, are eligible participate in this program in one of two ways. Option 1: Youth participate in this program by completing the AIRE program portfolio and submit it for review by our AIRE judges. All participants submitting an AIRE portfolio will be invited to participate in either the competitive portfolio review (open to youth ages 14-18) or in the non-competitive portfolio review (open to youth ages 11-13). Youth participating in the competitive AIRE review process are eligible to be selected to attend national events such as National Congress, National Conference, and International Leadership Conference. Option 2: Youth participate in this program by completing the AIRE program portfolio self-study and/or as part of their local 4-H program. Option 2: Does not require the participant to submit their AIRE portfolio for review.

Horse Judging Short Course

October 27-28, 2018 NCSU Main Campus

This short course is designed for individuals with limited horse show judging experience, coaches of youth judging teams, FFA instructors and all individuals interested in becoming judges or in attending the Open Horse Show Judge's Certification Clinic. Emphasis will be placed on teaching the judging systems appropriate for judging various classes in the western, hunt seat, saddle seat and non-trotting divisions. Participants will have a unique opportunity to interact one-on-one with experts to improve their judging expertise while learning the judging techniques taught at North Carolina State University, whose 4-H teams have earned numerous national and world judging contest championships. Participants will receive a judging manual and judge a variety of classes on videotape. Participants will also receive in-depth instruction on the judging systems specifically designed to train intercollegiate and youth judging teams and horse show judges.

North Carolina Open Horse Show Judge's Certification Clinic

November 18-19, 2017 NCSU Riddick Hall

Announcing the 33rd Annual North Carolina Open Horse Show Judges' Certification Clinic on North Carolina State University's Main Campus in Raleigh, NC. This clinic is designed to provide individuals who are, or aspire to be, horse show judges with practical "hands on" experience in judging saddle seat, hunt seat, non-trotting and western classes. Participating judges will have an opportunity to judge 20-27 conformation and performance classes, complete a required 50 question exam in each of the four divisions, and receive certification in these four divisions. A panel of breed recognized professional judges from across the nation will discuss the class placings and present lectures on judging procedures. Individuals completing the clinic will be included on a list of suggested horse show judges that will be annually revised and distributed to open horse show organizations located in North Carolina and surrounding states. Judges receiving an average score of 90% or higher per show division will be certified for that respective division. A minimum of 33% of participating judges will be certified in each division. Certification will be awarded separately for each division. A judging list will be forwarded upon request to breed associations for applicant judges and horse show organizations throughout the United States. Participation in the [NCSU Horse Judging Short Course](#) is highly recommended but not required for individuals new to the judging experience.

- Fescue Toxicosis Overview
- Metsulfuron for seedhead suppression
- Stockpiling Tall Fescue for winter grazing
- Warm season grazing alternatives
- Optimizing fertilizer inputs Clover establishment
- Renovation to Novel endophyte Tall Fescue

Horses and Horse Farms: Hurricane Preparedness

Hurricane season is upon us. Here are some tips to help prepare your horses and your farm for a storm.

Before the Storm:

- **Vaccinations:** All horses should have a tetanus toxoid vaccine within the last year. Due to the increase in mosquitoes after massive rainfall, all horses should also receive West Nile Virus and Eastern/Western Encephalitis vaccines at the beginning of the hurricane season.
- **Coggins Test:** A negative Coggins will be necessary if the horse needs to be evacuated.
- **Health Certificate:** A health certificate is required to cross the state line. This may be necessary if you live in a region that is near the SC/VA borders. A health certificate is valid for 30 days.
- **Identification:** Each horse should have at least 2 forms of identification. Have proof of ownership, including recent photos of the horse including any identifying marks/scars/coloration.
- **Evacuation Plan:** Make sure that you have a written evacuation plan, especially if you are in a low-lying area, a flood plain, near water, or are near the coast. If you will be in the path of the hurricane, it is highly recommended to evacuate prior to the storm. Decide at which point you will evacuate. Ensure that your truck and horse trailer are ready for travel (tires in good condition, etc.). Ensure that the vehicle is full of gas.

- **Water:** Each horse should have 12-20 gallons of water stored per day. Fill all available water troughs. Keep chlorine bleach on hand to add to contaminated water if necessary. To purify water, add two drops of chlorine bleach per quart of water and let stand for 30 minutes.
- **Feed:** Store a minimum of 72 hours of feed and hay per horse. Cover hay with water proof tarps and store on pallets. Keep grain in water tight containers in the event of flooding.
- **First Aid Kit:** Make sure that you have an emergency first aid kit ready and accessible (and water-proof!). Have any medications that a horse will need easily accessible.



- **Farm Preparation:** Secure all moveable objects. Remove all items from hallways. Place all large vehicles/tractors/trailers in an open field where trees cannot fall on them. Turn off electrical power to the barn to avoid any fire hazards. Ensure that all emergency tools are working properly and readily available.

During the Storm

- **In or Out?** Recommendations from the American Association of Equine Practitioners say that if the pasture has good fencing and limited trees, it is probably best to leave horses outside. If you have a sturdy shelter with access to a small, safe paddock, this would be ideal. Keep horses out of pastures and areas with electrical lines. After the Storm

- **Inspect Animals:** Carefully inspect all horses for injuries, focusing particularly on the eyes and limbs.
- **Inspect Property:** Look for down power lines, fence damage, and misc. debris. Take photos of storm damage to present to insurance companies.
- **Missing Horse?:** If your horse is missing, contact your local county animal control, sheriff's department, or disaster response team.
